INAUGURAL ADDRESS

OUR RICH HISTORY

In fact, this is the PennWest way. For more than a century and a half, our campuses have continued to deliver high-quality academic instruction, even as our country and communities experienced significant upheaval and daunting challenges.

Not many miles from here, in 1863, Abraham Lincoln reminded the world that this country is "dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal." At that time, our institutions were delivering instruction in Edinboro and California. Instruction in Clarion began a few years later.

Throughout the Reconstruction Era, the Great Depression, two world wars, the Civil Rights Movement, the dot-com bubble, 9/11, the housing bubble, and even a global pandemic, our institutions remained open, serving as access points for students, promoting upward mobility and acting as local economic hubs that respond to regional workforce needs and community development.

This core mission—to meet the higher education needs of the surrounding communities and contribute to the intellectual, cultural, civic, and economic development of the region—has remained consistent.

Founded in 1852 as the California Academy, the California campus later became known as Southwestern Normal School, California State Normal School, California State Teachers College, California State College, and California University of Pennsylvania.

The Edinboro Academy was established in 1857 by the region's original Scottish settlers as a private training school for Pennsylvania. It would later become the Northwest State Normal School, Edinboro State Normal School, Edinboro State Teachers College, and Edinboro University of Pennsylvania.

Operations began in 1867 at the Carrier Seminary of Western Pennsylvania. The campus later was known by several names including Clarion State Normal School, Clarion State College, and Clarion University of Pennsylvania. PennWest's fourth Global Online campus embodies our commitment to bringing innovative, flexible educational opportunities specifically designed to meet the needs of today's learners, wherever they may be in their educational journey.

It is now our time to serve as stewards of PennWest and shape an institution our alumni, students, faculty, staff, and communities will seek to engage with. As we begin this next phase in PennWest's future, we have a unique opportunity to redefine what a university can be and as we nourish our individual stewardships, our collective effort will create a PennWest people will flock to be a part of.

OUR BRIGHT FUTURE

As a proud member of Pennsylvania's State System of Higher Education, PennWest is built, funded, and operated to serve the higher educational needs of the Commonwealth. Specifically, the regions in western Pennsylvania that we serve. Students also serve as the hub for building social capital inside and outside the institution.

Our commitment to student success shapes our mission, creating an environment where our students feel valued and empowered to achieve their goals. Their achievements reflect the quality of education we provide. Students challenge us to evolve and inspire us to stay current with trends to meet their needs and prepare them for the future they will create. Our commitment to student success is embodied by our faculty, who are educators, mentors, researchers, and innovators who inspire our students, challenge them to think critically and guide them on their educational journeys.

Beyond the classroom, faculty contribute to our university's research initiatives, pushing the boundaries of knowledge and addressing pressing societal issues. Their work enhances our reputation and helps attract top talent to our institution. Faculty members serve as a bridge between our university and the broader community, engaging in outreach, collaborating with industry partners, and ensuring our curriculum remains relevant and impactful.

Our staff are essential collaborators in our student-focused mission. THE PENNWEST WAY

In the spring of 1997, my wife, Kristy, and I were adjusting to the birth of our first child and preparing for our senior year of our bachelor's degrees. We both had received scholarships, but finances were tight. So, we decided to leave school and join the workforce. Yet, my inquisitive mind and eager sense of learning kept calling me back to my university experience. After several years of work in the finance industry, I wanted to return to a career in education and make a difference for students in the same way that faculty and staff had made a difference for me. But I was stuck with some college (actually a lot of college), and no degree.

With some reservation, I reached out to the same department I had left. Fortunately for me, I received a warm welcome and incredible support from several faculty, staff, and one incredibly thoughtful department chair, named Gary Kiger. With their guidance and support, I was able to complete my degree, and the rest of my future in education became a possibility.

Years later, Dr. Kiger passed away, far too early, from brain cancer. Among his mourners was one former student, working in higher education, very grateful for the way he nurtured his stewardship, by caring for me and my journey.

We will meet every student where they are and help guide them to take their next step forward.
